

Rosie's Walk



Look at the front cover of the story 'Rosie's Walk' above. Talk to an adult about what you can see. Who are the characters in the story? Who is Rosie? Where is she walking to?

Today you are going to create your own version of story. You could draw your own map of the farm and add Rosie's trail through it or make a model of the farm using construction materials and act out Rosie's walk using toy animals or by making your own masks/puppets. Ask an adult to film you retelling the story and share it with us through Evidence Me.



Footprint Tricky Words

Draw some hen footprints on to pieces of paper. Write a tricky words on each of them or ask an adult to do this for you. Phase 2 tricky words: I, the, no, go, to, into.

Ask an adult to place the footprints around your house/garden leading to a hidden toy. You are going to be the fox, as you follow the footprints, can you read each of the tricky words that have been written?

If there are any tricky words that you are still unsure of make sure you practise reading and writing these. You could also practise all of the phase 2 letters and sounds we have been learning by writing sounds on each of the footprints instead of tricky words.

New Hazards for the Fox

In the story 'Rosie's Walk' the fox ends up in a lot of trouble following Rosie the hen. Can you think of a new hazard for the fox? Think about what would happen ifthere was a piece of rope across his path? A



bucket of water? A banana skin?

Draw an illustration of your new hazard for the fox and label it.

Talk to an adult or a big brother or sister about the picture you have drawn.

Physical Activities

Rosie's Walk Movements

Re-enact the story 'Rosie's Walk' sequence, using different movements for each of the characters; walking proudly and confidently as Rosie the hen; prowling using slow movements as the fox; buzzing around like a swarm of bees.

Play 'Rosie Says'

Play 'Rosie Says' with a beanbag or sock. Take it in turns with members of your family to be Rosie and give instructions to each other. "Rosie says... put the bean bag/sock on top of your head, underneath your feet, walk around the beanbag, jump over the beanbag etc.

Local Walk

Go on a local walk with your family, if you can't go out then create your own 'walk' around your house. When you are back from your walk see if you can recount it using lots of positional language like that used in 'Rosie's Walk', here is an example:

Understanding of the World and Creative Activities

Journeys

What journeys can you make on foot? Can you recount a journey you have made recently on foot e.g. going on a

walk with your family or walking to the shops? Draw a map of your journey.

Sorting the Rubbish

Help a grown up to sort out your rubbish at home. Learn about what can be recycled, or composted and what has to go to land fill. Can you sort your recycling into paper, plastic and metal?



Listening Walk

Go on a listening walk around your house, garden or in an outside space. What different sounds can you hear around you? Can you hear the same sounds inside and outside? Ask an adult to help you record the sounds on a phone and listen back to them. Can the find ways of reproducing the sounds using your voice?

Mask Making

Make your own hen or fox mask to help you retell the story of Rosie's Walk. You could make it from a paper plate or cereal box card. Remember to make the eyes big enough for you to see through them and then carefully cut them out.



Imagery Journey

Close your eyes and imagine that you are all going on a journey. With a member of your family talk about how you are getting there, for example, by bus, train, car, aeroplane or boat, and how the journey feels. Try to use all of your senses to describe the journey and then describe the place that you have arrived at. Use your imaginary thoughts to create a painting or picture - it can be of the journey; the place; or the vehicle that you travelled in.

You may have some of her stories in your own book collection at home, if you do pick one to read with your family.


