Monday 22 nd February	LI: Can I explore a setting in a book and identify what it is showing? Today you are going to look at an illustration from a book and explore what you can see.	Using the illustration can you come up with words to describe 10 things you can see? There is a purple mash template for you to write your list on or you can do it on paper and share to your Mrs Hunter's or Mrs Skinner's email for your class. Then with an adult explore and discuss these questions about the picture: Where do you think this is? What makes you think that? What can you see? What is happening? What time of day do you think it is? Why? What do you think it is like to be there?	
Tuesday 23 rd February	LI: Can I predict what a book is about from its front cover? Today you are going to explore the front cover of the book we are going to be learning about. 'One Day on Our Blue PlanetIn the Savannah'. What do you think this is about? Use the illustration from yesterday too to help you and then explore the word Savannah with our activity.	Can you predict what our book is about and then research what Savannah means using these questions to help you: What does Savannah mean? Whereabouts in the world would we find the Savannah? Then watch this clip introducing the African Savannah and write a short description of what it is from your research: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=xQEIFcAXIHU Don't forget capital letters, finger spaces and full stops. Can you extend your sentences with and? You can either do this on the purple mash template or write it and email over on 2emails.	
Wednesday 24 th February	LI: Can I understand what free verse poetry is and identify the key features? For the rest of this week we are going to be thinking about the theme of this book and explore the language we can use in poetry. Before we can do that we need to think about what type of poetry we are going to write.	Today you are going to understand the key features of free verse poems. There is a powerpoint for you to follow to do this. Make sure you can say they key features of a free verse poem when you are finished.
